Local Organization Meets Rigorous Standards for Quality and Accountability

The notice comes from the Council on Foundations, a national professional association based in Washington, D.C.



"This is similar to the Good Housekeeping Seal for community foundations," said Steve Gunderson, Council on Foundations president and chief executive officer. "It says that the Fairfield County Foundation has demonstrated a

commitment to operational quality, integrity and accountability."

The National Standards for U.S. Community Foundations Program requires community foundations to document their policies for donor services, investments, grantmaking and administration. The program is designed to provide quality assurance to donors, as well as to their legal and financial advisors.

"This is critically important to our donors," said Amy Eyman, Fairfield County Foundation executive director. "When people make a charitable bequest, establish a fund or set up an annuity, they are putting their trust in us. They are counting on us to manage the investment wisely, honor their charitable wishes and, in some cases, provide lifetime income to a loved one. The National Standards confirmation says our house is in order."

Fairfield County Foundation offers a range of charitable funds, allowing donors to advance a cause such as education or the environment, support an individual organization, provide flexible support for community needs or recommend individual grants. In addition to affirming the organization's

philanthropic services, the confirmation validates Fairfield County Foundation's grant-making practices for the nonprofit community.

"Some say it's easier to create wealth than to give money away wisely," said Eyman. "There's some truth in that. Grantmaking is a lot like investing... we need to assess risks, weigh potential gains, diversify assets, monitor performance and operate fairly. When you see the National Standards Seal, you can be assured that we're committed to meeting the highest standards for grantmaking as well."

The National Standards for U.S. Community Foundations program is the first of its kind for charitable foundations in the United States.

The Fairfield County Foundation is a 501 (c) (3) non-profit that, along with its supporters, helps to sustain and enhance the quality of life and economic viability in our community. Its scholarship program helps to sustain opportunities for local youth to achieve their academic goals.
